Readings: Exodus 34:4-6,8-9, 2 Corinthians 13:11-13, John 3:16-18

On the feast of Pentecost last week, we reflected upon the God who speaks to us not in earth-shattering power and might, but in *the still small voice* or in the *gentle breeze*.

In today's feast of The Holy Trinity, through the readings, we discover what it is that he is *telling* us.

The readings speak of love: the loving relationship that is the life of the Trinity, and God's invitation for us to share in that life.

It may not seem obvious but, rather, a gradual process of understanding.

In the first reading, God reveals himself to Moses as a God of tenderness and compassion, slow to anger and rich in kindness and faithfulness. Then, in the second reading, St Paul tells them to live together in harmony and peace so that the God of love and peace may be with them. He sums up the revelation of the Trinity in his closing blessing: *The grace of Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.*

This God of tenderness and compassion, rich in kindness and faithfulness, according to one tradition, revealed Himself to Moses *after* the people he had led out of captivity in Egypt turned their backs on him and returned to the worship of idols which was the worst of sins.

And St Paul is addressing his letter to the Corinthians *in anguish and tears* at their dissensions and fickleness to the true teachings. (2 Cor 2:4)

In John's Gospel, just before he speaks so lovingly to Nicodemus, Jesus makes a whip out of some cord, scatters the money-changers' coins, knocks over their tables and drives out all the traders and their animals, telling them not to turn His Father's house into a market.

In spite of all this, Jesus is still able to tell Nicodemus that God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life.

These examples remind us of the tensions that always exist and have to be worked through if we are to grow in love with each other and in the Trinity.

We need always to remember that Jesus came to call sinners not the virtuous. (Matt 9:13)

Sharing in the life of the Trinity may sound rather impersonal and we may not feel particularly *loving*. Perhaps this is not something we need to *feel*; we just need to *know* and to *believe* that **He** is the Lord and God of tenderness and compassion, rich in kindness, faithfulness and forgiveness; who bestows upon us grace, love and fellowship so that we may not be lost but may have eternal life in the **Father and in the Son and in the Holy Spirit. Amen.**

This week's memorial

St Boniface (675-754) born in Devon, educated in a monastery in Exeter and became a monk of the Benedictine monastery of Nursling near Southampton.

An enthusiastic teacher and preacher, he ended up preaching the Gospel to the heathens in Germany and became Bishop of Mainz. He founded and restored dioceses and helped reform the Frankish church. At over 70 years of age he was set upon and killed while awaiting some neophytes for confirmation. He is honoured as the Apostle of Germany.

There is no place for selfishness and there is no place for fear! Do not be afraid then when love makes demands. Do not be afraid when love demands sacrifice. (**St John Paul II**)

RIISING COSTS

For everyone, the cost of living is presently rising at an alarming rate. Energy costs are at an all-time high, and the cost of essentials at the supermarket increases each week. So now is not a good time to appeal for additional help for the church's finances, but sadly, however, it is necessary. The heating bills for the church are rising just as much as in your homes, and the maintenance of the old buildings are a constant drain on the church's income.

So we are asking that if you can do so without making your personal situation much worse, could you consider adding a little extra in your weekly offering or monthly standing order? Just a 10% increase will help offset the much greater costs of electricity, gas and essential maintenance the church faces in the coming months.

Also, if you pay UK income tax, signing up for Gift Aid will cost you nothing, but allow the church to reclaim from the government an additional 20% of your offering.

Another extremely valuable benefit for the church, but one which is often not considered is that of leaving a legacy to the benefit of St Joseph's. If you are considering writing or making amendments to your will, this would be a perfect time to add a clause defining the amount you would like to give to the church. It is very important that any alterations to a will are officially sanctioned to avoid any issues at the time of probate. Thank you.
