Readings Isaiah 45: 1. 4-6. 1 Thessalonians 1: 15. Matthew 22: 15-21.

Some of us are old enough to remember the poll tax inflicted upon the nation by the Thatcher government during the late 80's. It caused dissention, riots, governmental resignations and in the end, it was the cause of her downfall. In today's Gospel, we hear of a much earlier poll tax. It was imposed upon the Jewish nation by the Romans: this probably began with the decree issued by Caesar Augustus while Quirinius was governor of Syria; when Mary and Joseph had to go to Bethlehem to register and of course it was where Christ was born.

The Pharisees and most respectable Jews if not all, resented paying the tax; not only because it was unfair but because one side of the coin depicted the emperor's head, describing him as 'Son of the Divine Augustus' and on the other side was a picture of the Roman goddess of peace and the words 'High Priest'; both blasphemous to the Jews since for them there is only one who is divine and that is God. And so, there were protests and riots from then on which it is understood, contributed to the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple in AD 70 by the Romans.

Other members of the community did not resent the tax for they were supporters of Herod, who was himself subject to the Roman Emperor, but owed his exalted position to him and so they supported the tax - these were the Herodians. They would have been despised by the Jews as much as the tax collectors who collected for the Romans. But in today's Gospel, they are brought together, united in trying to catch Jesus out and thereby have him arrested for sedition.

So, some disciples of the Pharisees with some Herodians in tow put the question to Jesus: is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not? If Jesus says it is permissible, then he alienates his own followers. If he says it is not permissible, then he can be arrested for sedition. Jesus asks for a coin: whose head is this he asks them. Caesar's, they reply. Well then, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.

As we reflect upon his words in the here and now, is Jesus advocating some kind of dual or double obedience - to both state and God...or even obedience to one and to give what is left over, to the other? A clue to a possible answer lies in our first reading where some 500 years before, God is addressing the pagan King Cyrus of Persia: as his instrument through whom he will liberate his (God's) people from their many years of exile in Babylon. (It is said that Cyrus actually read the prophesy of Isaiah and wished to fulfil it, which he did) The point is that all authority is subject to God along with everything else including King Cyrus, Caesar and any other leader. We may remember, after his arrest, Jesus saying to Pilate: *You would have no power over me if it weren't given to you from above;* (Jn 19:11) and it can just as easily be taken away, as Cyrus was to discover when he got above himself.

What then **does** belong to Caesar and what **does** belong to God? Here, we may turn to St Paul who tells the Christians in Rome: You must obey the governing authorities since all government comes from God...and... civil authorities were appointed by God and so everyone who resists authority is rebelling against God's decision... and that includes the payment of taxes. (Rom 13: 1-2. 6.) **So, there is nothing that belongs to Caesar independently of God since all things belong to God.** A little later, Paul tells them: owe no one anything except love for each other. The one who loves another fulfils the law, for love does no wrong to a neighbour... (Rm 13:8 & 10)

To conclude: whether it is permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not, seems to depend on how well Caesar or any leader or government embody the things of God such as justice, equity, peace, love and forgiveness...even of our enemies.

Meanwhile, turning to the present state of affairs; those virtues are, sadly but unsurprisingly lacking in the incendiary environment of the middle east at this time, and any expectation of their realization any time soon, unlikely, if ever. Yet, it was in this hallowed part of the world that God's message of peace, love and forgiveness took flesh and dwelt among us and all things are possible for God. In faithful perseverance then, we must continue to pray on their behalf, that peace, love and forgiveness once again, become flesh in those troubled lands, through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Reflection

Forgiveness is above all a personal choice, a decision of the heart to go against the natural instinct to pay back evil with evil. It demonstrates the presence in the world of the love which is more powerful than sin. (St John Paul II)
