Family Fun Day: On Saturday, 15th June our Summer Family Fun day will be taking place at the parish hall.. The first of our three non-uniform days is next Friday (May 10th). In exchange for coming in their own clothes, we would like pupils to bring unwanted gifts which can be recycled.

Classroom Catch Up: This week, in science, Class R/1 have been investigating the difference between a deciduous and an evergreen tree. The children enjoyed illustrating the changes to a deciduous tree throughout the different seasons. In history, we have been busy exploring the achievements of many great past and present explorers including Neil Armstrong, Matthew Henson, Ellen MacArthur, Mary Kingsley and Christopher Columbus. We talked about what makes each of them significant individuals. Maths wise, Reception have been adding and taking away using single digits, while Year One have been making arrays, doubles and equal groups. To end a busy week, we enjoyed a trip to Stanley Grange on Friday afternoon.

Class 2/3 have started their new English unit using the book "Leonora Bolt: Secret Inventor". The children have loved the opening chapter. Why not ask them if they would like to invent something? In maths we also started a new unit—fractions. The class used charcoal drawings to depict the empty tomb and Jesus' resurrection in RE. It has been a very productive week in Class 4/5. In English, we have finished our text for this half term "Hidden Figures" and will now be moving on to producing biographies about the women. In science, the children have been learning about the planets and their features - something which they really enjoyed. In R.E., we are continuing with the Easter story which links to our unit based on sacrifice. This week, we were thinking about the arrest of Jesus and his actions at this time. In Collective Worship, we explored the Scripture linked with Jesus as the Vine and the meaning of this. The children thought about how this links to their lives and how Jesus provides us with the tools we need to grow and become the best version of ourselves as well as providing support when needed.

In Class 6 this week, we have been in the middle of our Mock SATs. It is actually an understatement to say that the class have given it everything - they have given so much more than 'everything', and this is evident in the scale scores which are starting to come out! In Maths, we have been looking at finding missing angles in all polygons, remembering the formula of $(n-2) \times 180$ to find the sum of the internal angles - hard, but very satisfying when it is understood!

Golf Taster Day: On Tuesday, every year group enjoyed a game of golf! PGA professional Stu Warren was in school to make sure pupils practised different skills such as putting, chipping and driving.



Stanley Grange: This week's group picked more comfrey to top up the homemade fertiliser. They also constructed pea frames from bamboo sticks and then planted peas and beans in our plot. Pupils also checked on, and watered, our potatoes.

What Parents & Educators Can Learn from the OFCOM MEDIA REPORT 2024

Each year, Ofcom - the UK's regulatory body for communications - produces an overview of children and parents' media experiences over the course of the previous year. At the time of writing, the latest of these reports, 'Children and parents: media use and attitudes 2024' has just been published, and we've plucked out some of its most thought-provoking findings regarding online safety.

68% of children played video games online

ONLINE SAFETY IN SCHOOLS

- 93%** 8-17s had at least one lesson about online safety
- 93%** of children are aware of at least one thing they can do to stay safe online
- 91%** children found these lessons useful
- 78%** of 8-17s were aware of age restrictions for apps
- 40%** admitted to faking their age to bypass these limits

PARENTAL CONCERNS

The things that most commonly worry parents and carers about their child being online include ...

- 77%** seeing age-inappropriate content
- 70%** being harassed or bullied
- 68%** seeing pro-self-harm content
- 62%** having their data gathered by companies
- 59%** being influenced by extreme views
- 55%** having their reputation damaged
- 51%** being pressured to spend money
