Readings: Acts 1:15-17,20-26, 1 John 3:11-16, John 17:11-19.

The Lord has set his sway (or throne) in Heaven and his kingdom is ruling over all.

This line from today's psalm suggests that from his heavenly domain, which could never be seen however powerful the telescope or indeed the microscope, God rules all that exists.

That is to say, God rules a universe 93 billion light years across containing more stars than there are grains of sand on the planet, some of these stars have a radius thousands of times larger than our own sun and God has been running it all for over 13 billion years.

These and many more figures, are all 'out there' on the internet and they vary by a few billion years, but they all point to the mind-blowing immensity of the universe and of how small and frail our little earth and sun are by comparison – though, of course, it is all relative depending upon whether we are looking through a telescope, a microscope, whether you are the smallest particle or the largest galaxy or of course, whether you are God.

Yet, in all its immensity, it cannot be compared with the power and sublimity of **God's kingdom** from where he rules from his holy throne ... these are simply images attempting to express the inexpressible.

If we feel lost, insignificant or even terrified at the mass of matter swirling around us as far and further than the eye can see, let us look again at today's psalm to find some comfort.

The Church presents only three of its ten verses for us today and we have heard ...

... For as the heavens are high above the earth, so strong is his love for those who fear him.

It also says ...

... The Lord has pity on those who fear him; for he knows of what we are made, he remembers that we are dust. As for man, his days are like grass; he flowers like the flower of the field; the wind blows and he is gone and his place never sees him again,

But the love of God is everlasting upon those who hold him in fear ...

There are those who, though trying admirably to make sense of the universe, cannot make sense of their own lives within it regarding its purpose and meaning. There seems to be a reluctance to ask the fundamental question: why is there anything at all rather than nothing?

God gives us a reason through the words of the psalmist: my love for you is greater than all that you can see and cannot see around you ... it is greater than anything you can imagine ... that is to say; my love for you Margaret, for you John, for you Carol, for you Frank, for each one of us as individuals, but also as a family or community of faith ... I love you more than you can know.

And so, in our first reading, against the backdrop of supernova, of quarks, black holes and quantum physics – albeit yet to be discovered – we have a group of believers still recovering from their encounter with the risen Lord and his last instructions to them before disappearing from their sight, trying to organize themselves in such manner as to be able to spread this *Good News* of God's love for his poor creatures made of dust ... the same message given all those years before to the psalmist.

And the most important part of their message of God's love for the world is that, from his holy throne, God himself entered into his own domain, as St John would say ... the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us, giving to all who believe in his name, the power to become children of God.

God's kingdom is ruling over all and his rule is the rule of love.

It is through our love for one another that we are members of his kingdom as it grows and becomes visible through each one of us as part of Christs body for it is *in him that we too*, *shall reign*. (CCC 2816 *St Cyprian*)

So, rather than being an insignificant speck of dust upon a bit of grit floating through this vast sea of space, through God's choice of us and our response to him, we have been elevated as members of the heavenly kingdom which rules over all creation.

It is difficult even with God's help, but these considerations should bring us some comfort, less anxiety and hopefully, joy.

Reflections

From the beginning of his public life Jesus chose certain men, twelve in number, to be with him and to participate in his mission. He gave the twelve a share in his authority and sent them out to preach the kingdom of God and to heal. They remain associated for ever with Christ's kingdom, for through them he directs the church. (Catechism of the Catholic Church [CCC] 1994 No. 551)

As my Father appointed a kingdom for me, so do I appoint for you that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom, and sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel. (Lk 22: 29-30)

Feast of the Dedication of Liverpool Cathedral of Christ the King
