

Readings: Exodus 24:3-8, Hebrews 9:11-15, Mark 14:12-16,22-26.

Oft in the olden types **foreshadowed**: in Isaac on the altar bowed, and in the ancient paschal food, in the manna sent from heaven.

The *Sequence*, attributed to St Thomas Aquinas, (13th cent.) from which we are given the last three of its thirteen verses, attempts to describe what lies at the heart of every Mass: the Body and Blood of our blessed Lord given to us in the form of bread and wine.

A dim awareness that all was not well between humanity and God existed from almost the dawn of time and in *types and shadows*, God has gradually drawn humanity back to himself.

The pagan sacrifices of old were an attempt to appease a god or gods, so they believed, who at times, blessed and provided for the people or cursed and deprived them of blessings and provision.

Abraham and Moses also sacrificed but they were the first to respond to the authentic calling of the one true God.

The covenant God made with Abraham, of which Moses speaks in our first reading, along with their sacrifices, were but a *foreshadowing* and a preparation of what was to come: the new and eternal *Covernant* and *Sacrifice* sealed in the sacrificial offering by Jesus Christ in his own body and blood.

And so, the *Letter to the Hebrews* can speak of Christ as the mediator whose sacrifice being perfect, replaces all those of old, and which cancels out the sin, which, as the author concludes, *infringed the earlier covenant*.

In a nutshell, God's love for you and me, mediated through the death and resurrection of his Son Jesus Christ, cancelled out our sin and opened for us the way back to God and our eternal homeland ... opened up for us ... because we can choose not to accept this incredible gift.

This revelation of God's love for us through Jesus Christ, we celebrate **as a community of faith** primarily on Sundays and Holydays of Obligation.

We all gather on the day of the sun, for it is the first day after the Jewish sabbath, but also the first day when God, separating matter from darkness, made the world: and on the same day, Jesus Christ our Saviour rose from the dead said Justin Martyr in the 2nd century.

The third commandment is to keep the Sabbath holy.

Sunday is our Christian Sabbath; set aside as a day of rest from servile work, and for the devotion to the Lord who saved us and it still remains a grave or serious sin to choose not to attend if one could have. (CCC 2181)

The Catechism (CCC) gives reasons for this. It says: participation in the Sunday Eucharist is part of our belonging and giving witness and testimony to Christ and his Church.

If Holy Mass, the source and summit of our communal prayer, is the occasion par excellence of our encounter with God on this earth through his Word and in the Sacrament of his love for us, if it is the celebration from which we receive the priceless gift from God of his Son in such a unique and special way in Holy Communion and if it is the occasion and place where resides the blessings of the Holy Spirit, why would we not want to come.

To choose not to come to Mass does not result in God's rejection of us but our rejection of God.

For God cannot give to us the grace of his forgiveness, his love and all the other benefits he has won for us if we freely choose not to receive them.

To choose not to attend Sunday Mass is like choosing to say No! to the only consultant who can cure us of a terminal illness – mortis (death) follows from which mortal sin gets its name.

Today, after its withdrawal due to Covid, we rejoice at being able to restore reception of the Chalice for those who wish to participate more fully in the words of Christ at the last supper: *take eat ... take drink*.

So, on this, the feast of Christ's Body and Blood, let us renew our love and commitment to this greatest of gifts given to us by our Lord and pray with thanksgiving for the generosity of our *Special Ministers of Holy Communion* as they renew their commitment to their ministry which is so vital to our parish - especially those unable to get to Mass

This week's commemorations

St Charles Lwanga and 22 companions (19th cent) were wrapped in reed mats and burnt alive for criticising the Ugandan King Mwanga for debauchery, murder and gross immoral acts. Most were converts from paganism, the youngest being only 13, and some worked as servants in the King's household. Within one year of their deaths, the catechumens in the country quadrupled. Charles Lwanga is the patron of Catholic Action and of Black African Youth since all of those Martyrs were under the age of 25.

St Boniface (675-754) born in Devon, educated in a monastery in Exeter and became a monk of the Benedictine monastery of Nursling near Southampton.

An enthusiastic teacher and preacher, he ended up preaching the Gospel to the heathens in Germany and became Bishop of Mainz. He founded and restored dioceses and helped reform the Frankish church. At over 70 years of age he was set upon and killed while awaiting some neophytes for confirmation. He is honoured as the Apostle of Germany.

The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus and The Immaculate Heart of Mary might be summarised in the following prayer: O Sacred Heart of Jesus, for whom it is impossible not to have compassion on the afflicted, have pity on us miserable sinners and grant us the grace which we ask of you, through the sorrowful and immaculate heart of Mary, your tender mother and ours.
