Readings: Job 38:1.8-11, 2 Corinthians 5:14-17, Mark 4:35-41

Job and his comforters try to explain God's purposes in afflicting Job with so much suffering and our first reading has God responding from the tempest. In today's snippet, God uses the sea to make his point to Job: when **you** have the power to control the sea (and all the other elements) the way I can, then level your criticisms at me...

The psalm too reflects and praises God's awesome power over the waters preparing us for today's gospel.

Jesus and his disciples are in a boat crossing the Sea of Galilee when a storm is whipped up, threatening to sink the boat. Jesus is asleep and seemingly disinterested so they wake him: Do you not care? We are going down! He wakes, calms the storm with a rebuke and then rebukes the disciples for their lack of faith. The event leads them to question who is this that even the wind and sea obey him.

The Church may be seen as a ship sailing through the centuries; sometimes during times of calm but more often during times of turbulence, struggling against the winds of opposition, persecution and so forth.

For us here today, it is a different crisis, for as you know, there is a shortage of priests and religious; and church congregations have been diminishing over many years, at least in this country.

Bishops have had to amalgamate parishes, close church buildings and so forth, so that many, if not most, priests are running more than one parish.

Abbots like bishops have the same problem: too many commitments for the number of priests or brethren available to properly take care of them.

Sixteen years ago, I came to Brindle St Joseph's believing that I would not be here for long because Ampleforth could no longer maintain all the parishes, for we simply had not the personnel to do it. A *Chapter* decision was to start the sad process of relinquishing parishes – Brindle being one of the first to be let go. You may remember

Abbot Cuthbert speaking of this on his *Visitation* about that time: 'to take care of your parish priest because he will be the last Ampleforth could afford to send'.

In the event, while other parishes were relinquished, I have remained here for 16 years – that is not a bad *innings* even by diocesan standards.

But there is now a need for that chapter vote to be enacted as the Abbot finds himself trying to find answers for a shrinking community and obligations to our remaining parishes closer to the monastery.

All I can tell you at this point is what some of you already know because you have helped me in my struggle to come to terms with it over the last two years ...

... namely, that from January 2025, discussions will take place between Ampleforth and the diocese for the handing over of the pastoral care of Brindle St Joseph's by August 31st 2025.

During his Visitation in October of this year, the Abbot will clarify and explain further the reasons why this must happen and what the stages of handover will be.

As for myself, I return to Ampleforth by the end of August 2025.

The reason for telling you this now, before the Abbot's visit in October, is because the deanery needs to consider various scenarios as it considers its own future.

So, to conclude: Abbot Robert will come and address you during his October Visitation and discussions concerning the handing over of pastoral care of St Joseph's to the Archdiocese of Liverpool will begin in January 2025 with a view to my return to Ampleforth by the end of August 2025.

What do we do in the meantime?

We carry on, always open to the Spirit and take to heart, each one of us, the words of St Paul in today's second reading: for anyone who is in Christ, there is a new creation; the old one has gone and now the new one is here.

Every change is a new beginning for those open to the Spirit and everyone needs to play their part if we are to show that this parish is vibrant, alive and active in the Spirit.

But most importantly, despite these choppy waters: to remember in whose ship we sail, who is really in charge and to call upon Him for guidance.
