
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Saints Peter and Paul 30th June 2024

Readings: Acts 12:1-11, Timothy 4:6-8,17-18, Matthew 16:13-19.

Today's feast is about two colossal pillars upon whose shoulders the church has stood for over two thousand years.

Throughout the Bible, we see God choosing the most unlikely people to carry out his will on earth and among the most unlikely were St Peter and St Paul.

In Luke's Gospel, after netting a huge catch of fish on Jesus' instructions, Peter recognizes something very holy in Jesus and falling to his knees, begs Jesus to leave him for *I am a sinful man*. But Jesus says up!... and I will make you a fisher of men.

Peter tries to walk on water but his faith fails him and has to be rescued by Jesus: 'Lord, save me' he cries and Jesus reaches out and holds him. 'Man of little faith' he says, 'why did you doubt'.

Also, we remember how, after Jesus' arrest, Peter three times denied knowing him and how Jesus gives him a second chance to affirm him which he does, three times.

As for the unlikely calling of St Paul: who would have thought that this chief agent of the Jewish high priest for the suppression of those early Christians, described in *Acts* as *still breathing out threats to slaughter the Lord's disciples*, would, by God's grace, become Christianity's chief agent for its spread beyond the Jewish nation to the non-Jews or gentiles – so headstrong, combative, argumentative to the point of falling out with his co-workers in Christ. (*Acts 15:30*)

Both Peter and Paul were flawed characters.

In today's first reading, we find poor Peter, his old life of relative calm on the lake turned upside down by his encounter with Jesus, (who has now returned to his Father in heaven) bamboozled and in a daze by another divine encounter as angelic forces release him from prison where he had been incarcerated for being a Christian – by the power of that *unremitting* prayer? It would seem that God had more work for him to do on earth before he was to take him to himself in martyrdom – for it is for our reunion with God in heaven that all prayer is, in the end, directed.

In his letter to Timothy, St Paul could be speaking for St Peter when he says: *The Lord stood by me and gave me power...* so that he could spread the message of God's love to the wider non-Jewish world; while for Peter, his calling was to spread the message of God's love to the Jews; but both Peter and Paul realized that *anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him. (Acts 10: 35)*

Jesus commissions his eleven disciples to teach what he has taught them (*Mt 28:20*) and to retain or forgive sins, (*Jn 20:22-23*) but it is Jesus' specific commission to Peter with reference to the keys and of Peter being a rock and foundation upon which the church would be built, that puts Peter, as some might say, the first among equals.

Tradition has them both being martyred in Rome during the Christian persecutions of the emperor Nero and so Rome becomes the centre of the global and universal Christian church.

The feast of Saints Peter and Paul teaches us many things, especially about perseverance in faith and the need to keep our eyes focused firmly on Jesus if we are to remain above the forces that would suck us under and into a turbulent sea of despair.

But perhaps the most important lesson to take away from this feast is that vulnerability and weakness, so easily scorned by the world, is not an issue for God as we saw in his choice of Saints Peter and Paul.

But the question he posed to Peter he poses to us too: who do you say I am?

It is a question he asks of us every day of our lives, and our present and future happiness depends upon our answer.
