Readings: Isaiah 35:4-7, James 2:1-5, Mark 7:31-37.

The eyes of the blind shall be opened and the ears of the deaf unsealed.

It is easy to link Isaiah's prophecy in our first reading with Jesus's healing of the man described as deaf and with a speech impediment in today's Gospel.

The way in which Jesus fulfils the prophecy makes for uncomfortable reading for the microphobe among us, by which I mean, those who would feel uncomfortable swigging out of a shared bottle or being offered a drink in an unwashed sticky glass or cup.

Because, in the healing, Jesus appears to have used his own spittle and applied it to the man's tongue and ears before looking up to heaven with a sigh and saying *ephphatha* – *be opened* and the man was healed.

Another detail worth noting is the region in which he healed the man: the *Decapolis Region* where the non-Jewish gentiles lived – those considered by the Jews, beyond redemption.

Perhaps James had this story in mind among other accounts of Jesus's option for the poor and outcasts, when, in our second reading, he tells the brothers not to try to combine faith in Jesus Christ with the making of distinctions between classes of people.

So, what might these textual observations teach us?

Among other things, that the God in whom we believe is not a god who remains *out there* distinct, apart, as if not wishing to contaminate itself with this mucky world.

We believe in God who, through his Son, immerses himself into the very fabric of his own creation, spittle and all, to bring his healing, his light to the world through his words and actions.

So why did he forbid the man, now healed, to spread the good news of his healing?

Because the right time for that had not yet come. The world, and especially his closest followers themselves, needed time to have their own eyes and ears opened to the suffering that had to come before his glorification, so that the full meaning of his healing work may be understood and taken to heart in faith, and that takes a lifetime for most of us.

For even now, in the light of his death, resurrection and glorification, Jesus continues to reach into to the very depths of our souls, removing all that would impede us from hearing and proclaiming the *Good News* of his love and healing presence among us.

Reflections:

Love and suffering are clearly linked, like the sun and the light. We cannot love without suffering and we cannot suffer without love. (St Gianna Beretta Molla)

The secret of happiness is to live moment by moment and to thank God for all that he, in his goodness, sends to us day after day. (ibid)

This week's commemorations

St Ambrose Barlow OSB (1585-1641)

Of a noble Catholic family of Barlow Hall, Lancs, Ambrose had conformed to the Church of England but returned to the Catholic Church and became a priest and later a monk of St Gregory's Douai, France. He returned to England and worked near Manchester and Liverpool for many years, working from Morleys Hall near Leigh.

He celebrated daily Mass and recited his Office and the Rosary. He was arrested several times over the course of years but eventually, after a stroke and many pleadings to escape, while saying Mass on Easter Sunday, he was surrounded by the Vicar of Leigh and 100 of his armed congregation, taken to Lancaster Castle and condemned to the usual gruesome death of those days. He was distinguished for his love of the poor, his wit and kindliness and has been described by a contemporary as the man 'most likely to represent the spirit of Sir Thomas More'.

St John Chrysostom (347-407) – "Chrysostom" means "Golden mouth" – a renowned preacher and orator. In 398, as Archbishop of Constantinople, he reformed the corrupt morals of court, clergy and people.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross recalls three events: the finding of the True Cross by Saint Helena, the dedication of churches built by Emperor Constantine on the site of the Holy Sepulchre and Mount Calvary and the restoration of the True Cross to Jerusalem in AD 629 by the Byzantine emperor Heraclius, after it had fallen into the hands of the Persian Emperor Chosroes II in the AD 614 Sasanian conquest of Jerusalem.
