Readings Genesis 2:18-24. Hebrews 2:9-11. Mark 10:2-16

The first reading, psalm and Gospel are about the wonderful gift of marriage: God creates the man and from all the other creatures, seeks to find a worthy helpmate for him. The man gives names to all of them - a sign of his power over them and his participation in God's creative act, but still no helpmate, until God sends him to sleep and creates a woman from one of his ribs. The man finds, that unlike the animals that were paraded before him, here is one with whom he can relate *bone from my bone, flesh from my flesh* ... whom he names *woman*.

A biblical note says: *in Hebrew, a play on words - ishshah 'woman' and ish man* and we are also told that the etymological names of the two are disputed, but Adam is taken to mean from the soil and Eve mother of all living beings. Thus, man and woman become one body, complementing each other as equals bound in marriage. As with other attempts to explain beginnings, who really knows how this union began but God alone.

The biblical story attempts to explain the origins of this unique commitment of fidelity and complementarity destined between a man and a woman sealed in marriage which would later be seen as reflecting the commitment and fidelity of God for his people. (Eph. 5: 21ff)

We are all familiar with the marital words of consent: *I do take thee to have and to hold, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish till death do us part.* This reflects Christ's commitment to his people (his church) though perhaps the words the couple in the giving of the rings better expresses it: 'I give you this ring as a sign of our marriage: with my body I honour you, all that I am I give to you and all that I have I share with you in the name ...' Christ lived that out for us to the point of giving his whole self for us on the cross when he died in the ultimate gesture of his love ... for us.

Sadly, while God's fidelity and commitment to his people is unchanging, because his nature, he is unchanging, that isn't always reflected in marriage among people subject to change and weakness, with each other and with God ... we remember them in our prayers. But it is a wonderful mystery and gift when one person can see in another something that no one else can see, and wish to commit their lives exclusively to them alone for the rest of their natural lives. Of course, monogamous relationships are to be found in the natural world. But among humans, it carries a special blessing because it is freely entered into - or at least, it should be.

Moreover, marriage between two **baptized** Christians, carries a special blessing and becomes sacramental and complete when carried out before Christ and his holy people, the Church, reflecting that original bond between a man and a woman brought together by God's own creative hand. Like all good things, like any vocation, marriage has to be worked at, but surely every happy marriage is a sign of God's love and commitment to his people and of hope for the world.

Reflections

The Church is deeply convinced that only by the acceptance of the Gospel are the hopes that man legitimately places in marriage and in the family, capable of being fulfilled. (St John Paul II)

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy ... wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord ... (Eph. 5:21ff)

This week's commemorations

Our Lady of the Rosary reminds us that October is set aside for this particular devotion. An opportunity for parents to teach their children how to pray the rosary and perhaps feel the power of her motherly intercession for our deepest needs.

Saint John Henry Newman was born on 21st February 1801 in London. As an Anglican clergyman for over twenty years he won renown as a preacher and theologian. A Fellow of Oriel College, Oxford, he became one of the leaders of the Oxford Movement and a prominent figure in the Church of England. On 9th October 1845 he was received into full communion with the Catholic Church by Blessed Dominic Barberi of the Passionist Congregation. After a period of study in Rome he was ordained priest on 30th May 1847. Returning to England he established the Oratory of Saint Philip Neri in Birmingham. He was an influential writer on many subjects, most notably the development of Christian doctrine, the true understanding of conscience, faith and reason, the role of the laity, and university education. In 1879 he was created Cardinal by Pope Leo XIII and given the title of San Giorgio in Velabro. He died in the Birmingham Oratory on 11th August 1890. He was beatified by Pope Benedict XVI on 19th September 2010 and canonised by Pope Francis on 13th October 2019.
