Readings: Wisdom 7:7-11, Hebrews 4:12-13, Mark 10:17-30.

Compared with Wisdom, I held riches as nothing.

The Word of God judges secret emotions and thoughts.

Go sell everything you own then come follow me.

Three lines taken from each of today's readings and if we add the first line given in today's psalm: *make me know the shortness of our life that we may gain wisdom of heart* then we may have a clearer understanding of our focus for this week.

But the Gospel sums it up: the man of great wealth asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life and Jesus lists some of the commandments which the man says he has honoured from his earliest days.

But Jesus *looked steadily at him and loved him*. There is only one thing you lack, he says. Go and sell everything you own and give your money to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven, then, come, follow me.

His face fell at these words and he went away sad for he was a man of great wealth.

Jesus then utters the saying so well known to us: How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God. It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.

It is not surprising that the man's face fell at these words and that the disciples were so shocked into asking: well in that case, who can be saved – for well-being and wealth were seen as blessings from God.

Since well-being and wealth brought respect, was it that the rich man couldn't face losing that respect?

Was it that, though he might be a good man, he clung too much to his wealth while people around him were in need – the proverbial good man who stands by while bad things happen around him.

Or is it that through this encounter with the rich man, Jesus is asking each one of us, what is it that we most value ... what lies within our hearts that we so desperately cling to. Is it to the passing things of this life, or to what endures beyond this life and forever?

To help the people of God remain faithful to him, there were the commandments and also the prophets who proclaimed the word of God to them. But all too often they ignored them and disasters followed, seen as God's punishment.

But the prophets also spoke of a time when they and the commandments of old would be replaced; for *deep* within them the Lord will plant his law – writing it on their hearts. He will remove their heart of stone and give them a heart of flesh and he will put a new spirit within them. (Jer. & Ezk.)

It is through Jesus that the spirit of wisdom comes, whom the writer of our first reading esteems more than riches and sceptres and thrones of power.

It is Jesus who reaches out to us every morning to fill us with his love and to give us hope.

It is to him that we reach out to during times of illnesses, affliction misfortune, who in the face of death reminds us of the shortness of our life, while still giving us joyful hope in him ... as we heard in our psalm.

The Letter to the Hebrews reminds us of the prophecies just mentioned and it sees in Jesus their fulfilment ... the word of God ... alive and active ... within each one of us at this very moment, slicing into the very core of our being, judging our most secret emotions and thoughts.

What he seeks to do in our heart is root out anything that may get in the way of his wisdom and love and in this we engage with him in prayer and love.

We have just celebrated the feast of St John Henry Newman whose motto was *Heart speaks unto Heart*. Pope Benedict XVI said that his motto leads us *into the understanding of the Christian life as a call, experienced as the profound desire of the human heart to enter into intimate communion with the heart of God.* 

The Lord understands the mess and muddle he finds in our hearts, but he continues to look steadily at us and to love us as he did the rich man in the Gospel because, though we may have difficulty believing it, nothing is impossible for God.

#### This week's Saints

**St Theresa of Avila** (1515-82) Virgin and Doctor of the Church. Founder of the reformed (Discalced) Carmelites. She met with a lot of resistance but persevered exclaiming 'Heaven preserve us from stupid nuns'. *The Way of Perfection* and *The Interior Castle* are two of her better-known works.

**St Ignatius of Antioch** (d 107) Not much is known about him except from his letters on his way to the martyrdom that he sincerely sought. He was to be thrown to the lions in the arena at Rome and in his letters he urged no interference with this destiny, glad to be as 'wheat ground by the teeth of the lions into the pure bread of Christ – a true sacrifice to God'.

**St Luke** the Greek physician and sometime disciple of St Paul who accompanied him on some of his missionary journeys. He is the author of the third Gospel and The Acts of the Apostles. His Gospel emphasises compassion, poverty, prayer and purity of heart. He is, of course, the patron of doctors.
