Readings: Deuteronomy 6:2-6, Hebrews 7:23-28, Mark 12:28-34.

In today's Gospel, a scribe or lawyer asks Jesus which is the first of all the commandments.

Jesus replies: Listen Israel, the Lord our God is one Lord and you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: you must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.

In his answer, according to this gospel, Jesus couples together two commandments given to Moses: one from Deuteronomy as we have seen, the other (love of neighbour) from Leviticus.

The question was, which is the **first** of all the commandments ...?

The first three of the ten commandments: to honour God, to honour his name, to keep the sabbath holy, are directed toward God himself, the rest are about honouring and respecting other people in various ways.

In effect, Jesus summarizes all of them as love of God and love of neighbour in that order of priority.

But what do we mean by love and what did Jesus mean?

Perhaps, more has been written in song, prose and verse about love than on any other subject, but its meaning still eludes most of us.

The hippies of the sixties tried to define it, through the haze of whatever they were on, as peace, love (luv) and that anything goes so long as you are not hurting anybody.

Others say that love is wishing the well-being of others and that while we need not be obliged to 'like' everybody, we must, nevertheless 'love' them which still leaves the actual sense of what love means, vague.

All of these, and many more, have some truth in them but look at what happens when the notion of love excludes God: **abortion**, **assisted dying** and **euthanasia**, advocated in the current political climate by good and kind people who wish for the well-being of others.

But both Moses and Jesus (earlier in this gospel) quote the fifth commandment: you shall not kill.

Unfortunately, the Catholic Church is not unfamiliar with violence and killing in its long and chequered history but as it gropes its way toward *Truth* – led by the *Spirit of Truth*, it leaves old ways behind. For example, recent popes have spoken against capital punishment though it is not quite explicitly forbidden in *The Catechism*. (CCC 2267)

But its overall teaching on the rights and dignity of God-given human life, has been consistent; not because the church has made this up, but because God himself tells us so.

To return to the question: which is the first of the commandments?

Jesus' answer: to love your God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength and only after that, to speak of neighbour; puts God first and centre which provides us with an *objective* guide to the meaning of life and especially, the meaning of love.

The alternative is to be guided by a well-meaning but misguided secular social conscience, itself subject to the ever-changing whims and fancies of the age.

To summarize: it is in the revelation of God's will for us in Jesus that we find the fullest expression of what love is and means.

For God so loved the word that he gave his only Son so that all who believe in him may have eternal life. (Jn 3:16)

And he teaches us the meaning of love by his example of selfless and forgiving service to others to the point of giving all that he could, which was for him ... his life.

He asks us to do the same as best we can and gives us the grace to help us.

The meaning of love then, can only be found in Jesus who is in his person, the perfect expression of God's love for you, for me and for the world.

Reflections

All our religion is but a false religion, and all our virtues are mere illusions and we ourselves are only hypocrites in the sight of God, if we have not the universal charity for everyone: for the good and for the bad, for the poor and for the rich and for all those who do us harm, as much as those who do us good. (St John Vianney)

This week's commemorations

St Charles Borromeo (1538-84) Cardinal Archbishop of Milan. He reformed the breviary, the catechism, the missal and promoted the education of the clergy. His reforms were not always well received: his aunt, a Dominican nun opposed his introduction of separation grills in convents. On visitations he had doors slammed in his face, he was fired at and a disgruntled monk tried to assassinate him. He gave much of his property to the poor, set up Sunday schools and when famine came, he fed and cared for 3,000 people at his own expense.

Dedication of the Lateran Basilica (c324) The Cathedral Church of Rome built on the site of an ancient palace belonging to the family of the Laterino. The original Basilica was built by the Emperor Constantine in 324 and given to the Bishop of Rome where they presided until the 14th cent. The present one, dedicated to St John, is where the Pope has his Seat as Bishop of Rome. It is the Mother and Head of all the churches in the city and throughout the world, and is therefore the sign of unity.
