Readings: Daniel 12:1-3, Hebrews 10:11-14,18, Mark 13:24-32.

As we move toward the end of the liturgical year and to the *advent* of the coming of Jesus Christ which we celebrate at Christmas, the liturgy also reminds us of his second coming at the end of times in the apocalyptic language of the prophet Daniel in our first reading and our Lord's in the Gospel: *at that time*, (the angel) *Michael will stand up, the great prince who mounts guard over your people … a time of great distress unparalleled* and it goes on to speak of divine judgement … of those who lie sleeping but who will awake to everlasting life and those who, in their shame, will be condemned to everlasting disgrace.

It might be tempting to say: well, that's the Old Testament, the New Testament is about Jesus' love and forgiveness of everyone.

True, but he doesn't force people to follow him or seek his forgiveness and he reflects this in his teachings, such as the sheep who will be saved and the goats who will not, the rich man tortured in the heat for ignoring the poor man Lazurus now resting in the arms of Abraham, to name two among many examples of divine judgment on the free choices we make in Jesus' teachings.

In today's snippet, he speaks of the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory and who will send his angels to gather his chosen from the four winds, from the ends of the world to the ends of heaven.

As we look about us and see huge upheavals: migration, the disastrous effects of a changing climate, people whom some wouldn't trust to run a firework display, running or about to run countries with the greatest nuclear firepower the world has ever known ... all of this and more, may lead us to despair that these must be the signs of the *end of times* that Jesus speaks of.

But such signs have been with us in every generation in one form or another – the book of Daniel, for example, is responding to a horrendous time of persecution and the threat for the Jews of being wiped out under the tyrant Antiochus Epiphanes some 160 years before Christ and in the book of Esther, they faced a similar plight, and the bible is not unfamiliar with plagues, famines and the rest.

However, Jesus says of the end times: as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; none but the Father.

What these calamities, natural or man-made, might serve to remind us is of the precariousness of life for us as individuals and as a collective humanity – just look at the power of nature in the floods of Spain, the devastation of recent hurricanes and what earthquakes and drought can do to a nation – and that is before humanity's contribution.

So, what must we do then – the people ask John the Baptist in our Gospel reading on 3rd Sunday of Advent.

We will hear his answer to them on the day, but for us now, to deepen our awareness of God's presence in the world and his love for each one of us.

How might we do this?

Through **prayer**, for God not only wants a relationship of love with us, he wants dialogue with us too, as Jesus taught us when he gave us the *Our Father*.

Penance: as we have reflected above: we cannot assume that just because of God's love for everyone, there will be no consequences to how we live our lives. Jesus tells us, there will be judgement. In penance, we seek his mercy and forgiveness allowing him to recreate us through his sanctifying grace and give us a new start.

Acts of Charity: we all know of people towards whom we can extend our love and charity, not just by putting what we can afford to lose into an envelope or box for some remote, needy person, but people under our very nose.

Make efforts to **improve our understanding of God's love for us** by looking at the numerous podcasts and talks on the internet from reliable broadcasters like Bishop Robert Barron and his *Word on Fire* podcasts or Fr Mike Schmitz and his *Ascension Presents* podcasts (if you can cope with his gushing enthusiasm) and there is *Maria Radio* run by the Dominicans in this country and the Magisterium AI of which I have spoken before.

There are various devotions going on in other churches, if not here, that we could attend during Advent.

Finally, please do not forget the *Day by Day* and *Faith Alive* publications at the back of the church which, between them, give the daily Mass readings and a commentary and reflection on them.

In the past, our understanding of God was preached to us from the pulpit and the quality of that understanding was, in no small measure, down to the preacher.

Now, we can all access any level of understanding that we could wish about God from the internet instantly. If we can order our groceries and what-not over the internet, then we can also order, so to speak, a deeper understanding of the faith, it just requires effort.

But perhaps the best way to understand God's love for us and what he asks of us, may be no more than to read the bible and pray for understanding.

This week's commemorations

The Presentation of Our Lady celebrates Mary's dedication to God throughout her life springing from her Immaculate Conception. Her feast also commemorates the dedication of the Basilica of St Mary built next to the Temple in Jerusalem to honour that memory.

St Cecilia 3rd cent. According to a 5th cent legend, she was betrothed to a pagan but converted him and his brother to Christianity but she retained her virginity being, as she saw it, betrothed only to God. While the organ played at her wedding feast, she sung in her heart to the Lord "that my heart remain unsullied so that I be not confounded". Both her husband and brother were martyred, whose bodies she buried before being martyred herself.

At the foundation of the Academy of Music in Rome in 1584, St Cecilia was chosen as its patroness.
