Readings: Daniel 7:13-14, Apocalypse 1:5-8, John 18:33-37.

In today's Gospel on this feast of Christ the King, Jesus responds to Pilate's persistent questions about whether he is a king. In the end, it is as if he has to say: if you insist on calling me a king, then yes, I am a king, but mine is not a kingdom of this world for if it were, my men would have fought to prevent me from being surrendered to the Jews.

Jesus goes on to say that he came into the world to give witness to the truth and that all who are on the side of truth, listen to his voice.

What is truth Pilate asks and finds Jesus innocent of the charges brought against him but nevertheless, washes his hand of him by handing him over to be crucified.

Clearly Pilate was not on the side of truth even when it stared him in the face.

In last week's Gospel, Jesus tells his followers that though heaven and earth will pass away *my words will never pass away* (Mk. 13: 31)

As an aside: if we close our eyes and our ears, and imagine everything around us disappearing ie the heavens and the earth, then try to imagine what would be left.

Most people would say that 'nothing' is left – not even empty space – nothing except you who are doing the thinking.

But those on the side of *God's Truth who listen to his words that will never pass away,* know that God will continue to exist, simply because pure eternal existence is his mode of being... *I Am who Am* he replies to Moses

from the burning bush, which could be a way to state the impossibility of defining God who is *Pure Existence* with no beginning or end.

The words spoken by the Son of God likewise, have no beginning or end for they will never pass away.

Meanwhile, we open our eyes and ears to the reality of the world we live in and ask where or what is Christ's Kingdom?

Perhaps the simplest answer is to say that wherever love is to be found, there is, at least, a sign of his Kingdom, because God is love and *God's love for us was revealed when he sent his only Son into the world so that we could have life through him* as the first letter of St John tells us.

So, his kingdom is to be found in this world for, in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells us that he will be with his followers to the end of time.

But as we have seen, his words will out-live time and history, and our preface tells us that part of his sacrifice on our behalf was to bring us peace, to put humanity at rights with the Father and to present to the Father *a kingdom* of *truth* and *life*, *a kingdom* of *holiness* and *grace* and *a kingdom* of *justice*, *love* and *peace*.

It would seem that Christ's kingdom is of this world and beyond this world but it wouldn't be anywhere unless it lay within each one of us as subjects of the kingdom:

... for you must know, the kingdom of God is among/within you ... Look, I am standing at the door, knocking. If one of you hears me calling and opens the door, I will come in to share his meal, side by side with him. (Lk. 17:21 & Apoc. 3:20)

The Kingdom of God then, is not to be found in a *place* as such, but in the *person* of *Jesus Christ our King*, who walks among us and lives within those who open their heart to him and become signs and witnesses of his truth, his justice, his peace and his love ... in other words, you and me.

Reflections: ... it is beyond doubt that whoever prays for the coming of the kingdom of God within himself, is praying rightly, for the kingdom to dawn in him, bear fruit and reach perfection ... for God reigns in every saint ... (Origen on prayer)

As Christ was anointed Priest, Prophet and **King**, so may you live always as a member of his body, sharing everlasting life. (From the Liturgy for Baptism)

St Andrew, Apostle and disciple of John the Baptist, who introduced his brother Simon Peter to the Lord. A legend has it that sometime around the 9th century, King Angus and his army found themselves in danger of defeat by the Saxons in what was then, Northumbrian territory. Fearing defeat he led prayers and then saw a cloud formation of a white saltire cross against the blue sky. By that sign, he vowed to make St Andrew, whose relics were believed to have come to Scotland, patron Saint of Scotland.
