Readings: Isaiah 62: 1-5. 1 Corinthians 12: 4-11. John 2: 1-11.

Marriage feasts, celebration and rejoicing are the clear connections between our first reading and the Gospel.

The second reading, as usual, stands alone with its own, no less important lesson - this week reminding us of how the gifts of the Holy Spirit, manifest themselves in many and diverse ways through the many and diverse personalities that comprise the people of God.

Indeed, it is a hymn of celebration: the Holy Spirit rejoicing in its own existence along with the Father and the Son through the likes of you and me if we open ourselves to the life of the Trinity which has been likened to a dance into which generous and loving souls are swept up and participate.

So, in the end, we find this second reading very much a part of the theme of rejoicing and celebration.

What we see in today's readings and in the whole of Scripture, if rightly understood, is God's love for his people, so passionate that it is likened to the passionate love of a bridegroom for his bride: for as the bridegroom rejoices over his bride, so shall your God rejoice over you.

At the wedding feast of Cana, we find the words of the prophet fulfilled in the incarnate Word of God - Jesus, rejoicing at a wedding ceremony.

Though he did sound a bit grouchy when his mother asked him to do something about the shortage of wine: Woman, what does this have to do with me? My hour has not yet come.

Maybe he was in the middle of telling a joke or listening to one, we don't know, but what we do know is that rather than allow the party spirit to run dry, he fixed it. Fill those jars with water he tells them, right to the top. Each of the six jars we are told, holding at least seventy litres of water suddenly turned into wine and not just any old wine but the very best.

The Gospel describes this as the first of the signs or miracles that Jesus was to go on to perform.

A sign of what?

Of his Father's munificence, generosity, his love and concern for his people's happiness.

But we must not lose sight of the reason why Jesus performed the miracle for it is embedded in our faith as Catholics.

Jesus performed the miracle due to his mother's intercession and, in some form, we believe she continues to intercede on our behalf.

These reflections lead us to the here and now: for shouldn't the Mass be a joy-filled celebration of God's love for his people and his people for God, since at each Mass we renew our commitment: he to us and we to him in our communion with him and each other.

From prayers for a Catholic wedding ... in the wedding covenant you foreshadow the Sacrament of Christ and his Church.

It is by the fulfilment of the sacramental sign, that the mystical marriage of Christ with his Church might become manifest in the union of husband and wife among the faithful.

Our readings today then, remind us that God's love for his people is as passionate as a bridegroom for his bride, but even more so since being God, his love has no limit.

Secondly, it is within the context of a wedding that we learn to turn to Mary, his and our mother for all our needs.

Finally, it is within the context of Holy Mass that all of this comes together for us in the here and now, which is why every Mass is a thanksgiving celebration even though, in our weakness, we may not always feel like rejoicing in this truth ... but then neither do married couples.

O joy that flows from the knowledge of one's self! O unchanging Truth. Your constancy is everlasting! (Sr Faustina Kowalska.)

In a world of so much transition and change, we need to be rooted in the unchanging truth and constancy of the nuptial love God has for us, his betrothed and to call upon Mary to have a word with her Son for all our needs, for Jesus and Mary are as present here at this feast as they were at the wedding feast of Cana all those years ago.

Commemorations this week

St Agnes, Virgin and Martyr (d 305): a twelve- or thirteen-year-old who refused marriage due to her dedication to Christ. She was denounced and killed by the sword.

Because her name resembles Agnus, (Latin for lamb) the lamb became her emblem in art. Moreover, on her feast day, the lambs are blessed whose wool will be used to make the pallia worn by archbishops and which are made by the nuns of St Agnes Convent, Rome. In 1903, (rather gruesomely) her head was examined and found to be that of a girl of about twelve years of age.

St Francis de Sales, Bishop of Geneva and Doctor of the Church (1567-1622). As a priest, much of his time was given to winning people back from Calvinism which he achieved through effective preaching and being driven more by love than anything else, but Calvinism always posed a threat to his life. As Bishop he was devoted to the reorganization of his diocese but especially to the caring of souls through his preaching and spiritual guidance. He taught that whoever wants to preach effectively must preach with love and that all can live a devout and spiritual life, for holiness is not reserved just for monks and hermits. He was held in such high respect that a Calvinist minister said, "if we honoured anyone as a saint, I know of no-one since the days of the Apostles more worthy than this man".

The Conversion of Saint Paul celebrates his conversion from persecuting the Christians to becoming (with Peter) their foremost leader. 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?' From these words of Christ to Saul, we learn that what we do to each other we do to Christ for good or ill.
