Readings: Malachi 3:1-4, Hebrews 2:14-18, Luke 2:22-40.

As we have just heard: forty days ago, we celebrated the birth of the Light born among a people who walked in darkness.

The messenger to whom the prophet Malachi points is John the Baptist who prepared the people for the coming of the Light and he points him out when he came: *Behold the Lamb of God.*

And it is this prophet Malachi, whose name also means *messenger*, who 400 hundred years before Christ speaks of the Lord whom you seek, suddenly coming to his temple.

The Lord doesn't just come into a temple, he comes *suddenly*, and neither does he come into any old temple, he come into *his* temple.

The *Lord* of whom Malachi speaks is clearly Jesus Christ who, we remember, suddenly enters the temple, overturns the money-changers' tables and tells them that his Father's house should be a house of prayer and not a robber's den.

By contrast, in today's Gospel, we have a rather gentler entry of our Lord into the temple – in the arms of his mother as, with Joseph, they present him to God along with the turtle doves or pigeons as prescribed by the Law ... a modest offering we are told, for people of only modest means; enabling them, so to speak, to redeem him so that they could take him back home with them.

Their reverence for God and their observance of the Law is an example to us all, but at the heart of today's feast is the recognition of who Jesus is by Simeon and Anna.

Simeon is described as a devout and righteous man who, inspired by the Holy Spirit, knew he wasn't to die before he had seen the Lord's Christ, and Anna is described as a prophetess.

Both of them recognised and acclaimed the Lord when he came into his temple.

Simeon proclaims the *Nunc Dimittis* (*Now you let depart*) a fixture of night prayer to this day: *Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all people, a light for revelation to the gentiles and the glory to your people Israel and Anna rejoices, giving thanks and spreads the good news.*

So, Mary and Joseph enter the temple bearing Christ, the *Light* to the world.

On this feast which celebrates this event, let us remember that through our baptism, we too become bearers of Christ and our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit.

We may not feel that he is within our temples of flesh but, should he make a sudden visit, will he find his home a den of iniquity or will he feel at home in a house of prayer which he can fill with his light and love for all the world to see?

Reflections

Jesus is happy to come with us, as truth is happy to be spoken, as life to be lived, as light to be lit, as love to be loved, as joy to be given, as peace to be spread. (St Francis of Assisi)

This week's Saints

St Agatha (3rd c.) of Sicily was a young girl who vowed her virginity to Christ bringing upon herself the most violent cruelties from the pagan authorities. She was forced into a brothel and tortured by rods, rack and fire and was horribly mutilated before she died of her injuries in prison.

In his homily about her, St Methodius, bishop of Sicily, tells us that her name means 'good' and that 'her goodness coincides with her name and way of life. She won a good name by her noble deeds and by her name she points to the nobility of those deeds. Agatha, her mere name wins all men over to her company. She teaches them by her example to hasten with her to the true Good, God alone'.

St Paul Miki and companions St Paul was a 16th c. Japanese Jesuit who preached the Gospel to the Japanese people with great success. But during a persecution of Catholics, he and his companions were arrested, tortured and bound to crosses upon which they were speared.
