Readings: Gen 15: 5-12. 17-18. Phil 3: 17-4:1. Lk 9: 28 – 36.

As we look at the world scene, we seem to emerge from one crisis only to be plunged into another and we may find our faith and hope in better things to come, strained; since all seems to be looming dark clouds on the horizon.

We need encouragement; if only the tiniest glimpse of light and hope to keep going in faith.

Happily, we have a companion who has himself had to face dark horizons to say the least. Just before the *transfiguration* in todays' Gospel, Jesus warns his disciples:

The Son of Man is destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes and to be put to death, and to be raised up on the third day. (9:22)

We have always to remember though, that the Gospels were put together some years later than the events they describe, and in the light of the resurrection.

Therefore, later generations such as ours, are so used to thinking of Jesus as the *Son of God*, that we lose sight of his *humanity* and that he did genuinely suffer like us - just as last week we saw that he suffered temptations as we do.

So, in the face of the difficulties that lay ahead, even Jesus needed validation and the encouragement that he was on the right path - which was towards Jerusalem and his death *only after which* would come his glorification.

Thus, on the mountain with his closest disciples, they get a glimpse of his glory: the glory that he promises to all who follow him.

And from the cloud, his Father tells them why and how to follow him: This is my Son the Chosen One; listen to him.

Moreover, the presence of *Moses* and *Elijah* are a God-given witness to the Scriptures that spoke of Jesus so many years before and from which Jesus so often quoted during his earthly ministry.

If this was a glimpse of heaven, is it any wonder that Peter should want to erect tents in order to remain there; bathed in the blissful light of such heavenly company in the presence of God himself.

But no! they have to descend from the spiritual heights, to the material and mundane realities of life's struggles and the destiny laid out for each of them; which for Jesus would be in his suffering and death on the cross.

Today's *Preface* tells us why this experience on the mountain: it was to show, even by the testimony of the law and the prophets, that the Passion leads to the Glory of the Resurrection.

In our 2nd reading, St Paul says: For us, our homeland is in heaven, and from heaven comes the Saviour we are waiting for, the Lord Jesus Christ, and he will transfigure these wretched bodies of ours into copies of his own glorious body. He will do that by the same power with which he can subdue the whole universe.

So, as we look towards a horizon of looming dark clouds, let us pray to the One Lord who is really in control.

Let us pray for a silver lining in those dark clouds and that he transfigure our moments of depression and despair, into the hope and faith that he *is* with us in our sufferings, so that we can be with him in his glory.

This week's saints

St Patrick (385-461) Of British nationality whose father was a deacon and grandfather a priest. At the age of 16 he was captured by Irish pirates and enslaved in Ireland for six years tending herds. It was at this time that he was moved to fervent prayer.

He either escaped or was freed and returned to England where he was ordained priest.

He had very little education which he regretted all his life but nevertheless became bishop of Armagh back in Ireland.

He encouraged religious life; founding a monastery which became the centre of the Irish church and although of little learning, his writings reveal much about the church and life at the time and he is remembered for his simplicity, pastoral care and humble trust in God. But also for his fearless preaching especially to those who kidnapped and enslaved him all those years before.

St Joseph Nothing is known of St Joseph except what is said of him in the Gospels. He was a carpenter; he accepted the will of God; and he supported Mary and brought up Jesus. From the human character of his son we can see that he was a good and responsible father. He is widely venerated as the patron of artisans who honourably do good work with the gifts God has given them and of workers in general and he is a source of inspiration for all who adopt children.

Failure to undertake this penance on a particular Friday would not constitute a sin. However, penance is part of the life of every Christian and the intention to do penance is of obligation.

"The days and times of penance for the Universal Church are each Friday of the full year and the season of Lent." (*Canon 1250*)
